HAVE THEM REGISTERED | REHITATANGA

Registering and microchipping your doggo is a win for everyone – making missing dogs trackable (see our stolen dog story on page 2) and keeping the dog community safer (more on that below). A FOR AROHA — KEEP YOUR DOGGOS SAFE

In case Rocky, Chai or Pru Webster ever go missing, the whānau makes sure they get them registered every year. They include dog registration fees in the family budget. Paying between 1 July and 31 August gets the cheapest rates and leftover savings are used for family treats — like picnics. A swear jar can work well too! Did you know registration for desexed dogs is free for the first year of the dog's life?



NEED FOR REGISTRATION | HIAHIA

Your dog registration helps pay for our services that support the canine community. Our adoption scheme is one example. When you adopt a dog from us they are assessed for good behaviour, and the first parvo vaccination is free. Registration fees also help us to manage stray, barking and aggressive dogs. Our Animal Management Officers are out in our communities working with dog owners every day.

Pay your dog registration between 1 July and 31 August and you'll get the cheapest annual rates. Working dogs are cheaper. Disability dogs are free to register. Desexed dogs are free for their first year (with desexing certificate). Check out all the discounts on our website. Search for the 'fees and charges' document, then 'dog' to find the info.

Dogs are part of the whānau and also part of the wider canine community. We promote responsible dog ownership and encourage the desexing of dogs. Less unplanned dogs = a safer canine community. Registering your dog is about doing what's right.

New animal shelter opens

A purpose-built animal shelter near Kaikohe opened at the end of May to work in tandem with the Northern Animal Shelter. The 300sqm building includes 13 kennels (including three for quarantine purposes), four exercise areas and a vet room. It took nine months to build and cost \$2.4 million.
