Sports hub pace picks up

New sports and recreation facilities are quickly taking shape at Kaitāia and Waipapa. Construction milestones on Te Hiku Sports Hub are being ticked off almost weekly with concrete floors for the dry sports wing now poured and underfloor plumbing for the aquatic wing installed. The concrete base and block walls for the learn to swim and hydrotherapy pools are also complete. Following a brief Christmas break, work resumed on wet wing footings and dry wing steel framing. The hub is due for completion by the end of 2022. At Waipapa, a new entrance to the Bay of Islands Sports Hub from State Highway 10 has been built and construction of sports fields will begin midyear, once the work is consented. This will see premier football and rugby league fields created, along with multipurpose fields for winter and for summer cricket games. Work on carparking and footpaths is also due to begin soon.



The Far Northland District Council's Building Consents Authority Team processed nearly all consent applications in 2021 within the 20-day statutory period, placing it among the top building consents teams in New Zealand. Go to page 4 to read about the Council's top achievements in 2021.

Te Hiku 'pumped' by tracks



Te Hiku youngsters are loving new all-weather pump tracks built at Memorial Park, Kaitāia, and this one at Korora Park, Ahipara.

Kids of all ages and abilities have flocked to two new pump tracks opened at Kaitāia and Ahipara late last year. The competition-grade tracks constructed by Velosolutions have been a huge hit with young people eager to try out the courses. The tracks are part of Te Hiku's Open Spaces Revitalisation Project, funded by the Government's COVID-19 Response and Recovery Fund, and supported by Council. Revitalisation projects also support local businesses and boost employment.

Hokianga wharves completed



Significant upgrades to Māngungu wharf have improved safety for boats and other users.

Far North Holdings has upgraded Hokianga wharves at Māngungu, Te Karaka, and a boardwalk at Motutī. It has also completed a new wharf at Rangi Point. Upgrades at Te Karaka and Māngungu saw wooden decking and handrails replaced, and new pontoons and gangways added. New piles (plastic-sleeved to protect them from worm damage) were also added to Māngungu wharf. Finally, a pontoon was added to Motutī boardwalk. The work was completed before Christmas.

Holiday treat for skaters



Skateboarders and scooter riders are making the most of the new Kerikeri Domain skateboard ramp and bowl since it was opened in December.

A new skateboard ramp and bowl at Kerikeri Domain is proving a huge hit with adrenaline junkies. The skate park was built by pro skater turned builder Dave Crabb and will be officially opened along with a new basketball court in March. The skate park section was unofficially opened mid-December so it could be used over the holiday period. The skate park is part of a wider Domain upgrade funded by the Government's COVID-19 Response and Recovery Fund.

Te Hiku

We operate eight refuse transfer stations across Te Hiku Ward. Our Kaitāia and Taipā facilities open daily and accept bagged and bulk rubbish, green waste, and other rubbish types. Most recycling is free, including scrap metal and whiteware. Our remaining six Te Hiku transfer stations accept fewer types of waste, but all take bagged rubbish and recycling. Please check our website for details.



Kaikohe-Hokianga

Our Kaikohe-Hokianga Ward population is dispersed across many remote communities making disposal of rubbish and recycling a challenge. There are currently four refuse transfer stations and five community recycling centres serving these communities. Our Class 1 Kaikohe Refuse Transfer Station accepts a full range of rubbish and recycling. Most recycling is free, including scrap metal and whiteware. It also takes car bodies.

District rubbish and recycling centres

Bay of Islands-Whangaroa

Our Bay of Islands-Whangaroa Ward population is growing. It also increases dramatically over the summer holidays, putting extra pressure on our waste facilities. To help meet demand, we opened a new refuse transfer station at Waipapa in 2018 in partnership with Northland Waste. This year, we worked with Te Tii (Waitangi) B3 Trust to open a community recycling centre at Waitangi.

Our top 10 achievements in 2021

The Far North District Council's mission is to create great places and support our people. In the last 12 months, we have delivered a substantial programme of new infrastructure that will help to make the District a great place to live. We are also a progressive organisation and have made big improvements to our systems, processes and services. Below are ten of our biggest achievements in 2021.



A boardwalk extension the Council and Far North Holdings Ltd are building at Mangōnui is part of a \$107 million, Government-subsidised investment in new infrastructure across the district.

In May, we completed the largest infrastructure project the Council has undertaken when we switched more than 1,300 Kerikeri households and businesses to a new wastewater plant and extended sewerage network.

The new wastewater scheme positions Kerikeri for growth and reduces the town's dependence on septic tanks, which can pollute waterways if they are not maintained correctly.

We progressed, with Far North Holdings Ltd, a \$107 million works programme funded largely by the Government's Provincial Growth Fund and COVID-19 Response and Recovery Fund. Infrastructure improvements include road and maritime facility upgrades and place-making projects. A new enterprise park at Ngāwhā near Kaikohe will create jobs and education opportunities for local people.

In July, we started work on a

14 km pipeline that will connect
a Council-owned aquifer bore
at Sweetwater near Awanui with our
Kaitāia Water Treatment Plant. This
long-awaited infrastructure will reduce
the town's reliance on the Awanui River,
making the Kaitāia Water Supply more
resilient in dry weather. We aim to
complete this project before the
2022/23 summer.

The Northland Transportation Alliance (NTA) which manages Northland's roading network on behalf of Northland councils, completed 94% of planned works in its Far North District capital works

programme in 2020/21. This is a big increase on the road and footpath works the Council has historically been able to deliver. It is largely a result of the NTA's ability to manage resources and contracts across the region.

We started developing a
Bay of Islands Sports Hub on
a 46-hectare site at Waipapa.
The sports hub has a long-term vision
of operating seven days a week and
catering for seven sports codes.
The Council is also supporting the
development of sports hubs at Moerua
Park in Kaitāia and at Lindvart Park in
Kaikohe. The Te Hiku Sports Hub in
Kaitāia will have an indoor aquatic
centre when it opens this year.

We opened a new, purpose-built Northern Area Animal Shelter in Kaitāia. The new shelter caters for up to 20 dogs and has facilities that exceed minimum welfare standards. We are also developing a new, 14-kennel Southern Area Animal Shelter near Kaikohe and aim to open this later this year. We were fortunate to secure \$1 million of Government COVID-19 funds for these projects.

The Council improved its overall rating in a local government excellence programme that rates the performance of councils.

The CouncilMARK™ Independent

Assessment Board awarded the Council a BB rating on a nine-point scale (AAA to C) in April. The rating is an improvement on the B rating we received when we were one of the first councils to ask to be assessed under the programme in 2017.



Mayor John Carter opened a new Northern Area Animal Shelter at Kaitāia in July. The Council is Developing a new Southern Area Animal Shelter near Kaikohe.

Our Building Consents Authority Team was ranked among the top building consent authorities in

New Zealand, processing 99.63% of applications between July 2020 and October 2021 within the 20-day statutory period. This was despite high numbers of applications. In addition to this, the team received mainly positive feedback when International Accreditation New Zealand (IANZ) audited it in October.

Our efforts to ensure the Far North gets 100% connected to the digital world were recognised nationally when our digital strategy, Nothing But Net, won the Martin Jenkins Award for Better Policy and Regulation at the 2021 Taituarā Society of Local Government Managers (SOLGM) Awards in May. Since then, other Northland councils have accepted the strategy as a foundation document for region.

We implemented a hybrid working model that gives staff more choice about where they work. Allowing staff to work from home, as well as at the office, has boosted productivity and wellbeing, while reducing our operating costs and carbon footprint. The model helped to qualify the Council as one of three finalists for a Future of Work Award at Human Resources New Zealand's NZ HR Awards 2022.
