11 NRC/FNDC Hub with Flood Affected Kaitia Businesses- Minutes provided by Chair Josh Kirby Kaitia Business Association The five highest priorities to better protect **Kaitia and Awanui residents and businesses from future flooding** are:

1. Complete permanent flood protection works urgently

- Fast-track **Phase 1 and Phase 2 stopbanks, floodwalls and bank protection** rather than relying on temporary works.
- Secure central government and regional funding so permanent protection is not delayed.

2. Improve river capacity and critical infrastructure

- Upgrade **Donald Road Bridge** and the **SH10 Whangatane Spillway Bridge**, by Mahimaru Marae which act as bottlenecks during floods.
- Continue river maintenance, vegetation clearance and sediment management to improve water flow from the Awanui River to Rangaunu Harbour.

3. Strengthen stormwater and wastewater systems

- Improve urban stormwater drainage and provide emergency pumping when floodgates are closed during high river levels. North Park offered to hand over their flood pump.
- Resolve recurring wastewater overflows and ensure critical pumps are properly maintained and operated.

4. Improve flood preparedness and community resilience

- Provide better flood warning systems, clearer communication, and emergency response planning.
- Ensure residents and businesses receive timely alerts and can report flooding issues quickly for follow-up.

5. Plan future development to reduce flood risk

- Avoid locating new residential or commercial development in high-risk flood areas.

Practical Prompts for Councils but not a substitute for direct engagement with Īwi Māori. This report was prepared for Local Government NZ. Māori feedback was gleaned from a section in report 1, from the 4 Tai Tokerau Councils surveys. "Across the four councils, 2,305 survey responses were received. Whangarei District Council received 673 responses, Far North District Council received 611 responses to its first survey and 472 to its second survey, Kaipara District Council received 263 responses, and Northland Regional Council received 286 responses	



Both Far North District Council's and Kaipara District Council's surveys included a way for respondents to identify as responding on behalf of an organisation.

Māori response to Headstart

There is no one-size-fits-all model for local government reform. Any successful structure should be developed in genuine partnership with Īwi and Hapū, protect existing Treaty relationships and local voice, and ensure communities remain actively involved in decisions that significantly affect them.

Key themes include:

- Engage early with Īwi and hapū as Treaty partners, not simply as stakeholders, before decisions or proposals are finalised.
- Protect existing Treaty settlement arrangements, Tiriti obligations, MOUs, co-governance agreements, and local relationships, ensuring they are not weakened by structural reform.
- Protect Īwi and Hapū participation, with loss of Īwi and Hapū voice identified as the greatest concern & enduring Treaty-based relationships seen as the greatest benefit.
- Far North Māori organisations unanimously supported retaining strong local decision-making, with a preference for FNDC remaining independent.
- Kaitiakitanga (environmental stewardship), protection of whenua and wai, and recognition of Te Tiriti obligations were consistently identified as priorities.
- Public consultation should only occur where proposals are significant under Council policy or legislation, (ie transfer of a major asset, significant unbudgetted expenditure, or invokes a bylaw or amendment to Long Term Plan)
 - Reform should strengthen, not weaken, local voice, Īwi and Hapū authority, and practical participation in decision-making.

Across Tai Tokerau, Māori respondents consistently wanted:

- lower costs that are demonstrably achievable;
- protection of local decision-making;
- meaningful relationships with Īwi and Hapū that reflect Te Tiriti.
- strong taiao environmental outcomes; and
- careful management of any transition.

Across these surveys, 110 organisations were identified, of which 43 were Māori organisations, including marae, hapū, iwi, and Māori trusts

- 142 Māori-identifying respondents from Whangarei District Council
- 97 Māori-identifying respondents from Northland Regional Council
- 42 Māori organisations identified across Far North District Council's surveys
- 1 Māori organisation identified through Kaipara District Council's survey.

These groups are presented together where the data allows, and separately where it does not.



The section also draws on a formal submission made by Te Rūnanga ā Iwi ō Ngāpuhi, addressed directly to the Mayor of Far North District Council as part of this community feedback process

Among the Māori organisations that responded through Far North District Council's surveys, the most common position (31%) was a preference for Far North District Council to remain on its own with Northland Regional Council's functions absorbed. A further 26% opposed amalgamation outright.

A number of organisations supported some form of combining councils. Te Rūnanga ā Iwi ō Ngāpuhi supported a Northland unitary authority in principle, on the condition that strong, durable, and Treaty-consistent Māori representation is embedded in its governance, including entrenched Māori ward seats, a statutory cogovernance committee, and protections built into the Ngāpuhi Treaty settlement. Te Rūnanga ā Iwi ō Ngāpuhi was explicit that a unitary authority which replicated or worsened the current state would be actively opposed.

Te Uri o Hau Settlement Trust expressed uncertainty, citing its February 2026 submission opposing the Government's directive to reorganise local government in Northland and concern about the impact of councils changing or combining on existing Treaty settlement arrangements and iwi-council relationships.

The written responses from Māori respondents across all four councils were among the most substantive in this entire report, with several themes emerging consistently.

Cost, rates, and services featured across both Whangarei District Council and Northland Regional Council's Māori responses. Whangarei District Council's Māori respondents were particularly concerned about rates equity and the risk of one part of Northland subsidising another.

Northland Regional Council's Māori respondents connected cost concerns more directly to environmental funding and service continuity in rural areas. Environmental protection ran more strongly through Northland Regional Council's Māori responses than anywhere else in this section. Responses drew on kaitiakitanga values, raising specific concerns about freshwater, biosecurity, coastal management, and climate resilience being weakened. One respondent highlighted the role of marae as existing nodes for environmental monitoring and community resilience, questioning why this network was not being drawn on more actively rather than creating new governance structures.

Local voice and representation was a consistent concern across both Whangarei District Council and Northland Regional Council's Māori responses – particularly that rural, remote, and smaller communities, including Māori communities, would be overlooked in a larger structure.

Views on Treaty-related representation appeared from Māori voices across the region. Northland Regional Council's Māori respondents in particular offered detailed positions on Te Tiriti o Waitangi obligations, the importance of hapū and mana whenua participation in decision-making, and the risk that Treaty responsibilities could be diluted or transferred without preserving the relationships and institutional knowledge behind them.

Far North District Council's Māori organisations' written responses reinforced the same concerns – loss of local voice, rural communities being overlooked, and the importance of maintaining accessible, locally connected governance. Several responses were in te reo Māori, reflecting the linguistic and cultural depth of engagement with this question.



Mon 6 July Kaitaia Airport Upgrade and Resilience Project – Partnership Team -

comprises of mana whenua owners Iwi Ngai Takoto and Ngāti Kahu hapū:- Ngai Tohianga, Te Pātu Marae and Patu Koraha , Far North Holdings Ltd, Far North District Council. FNHL Project Manager Andrew Bere-Adams gave an update of progress so far. 

- **Runway upgrade:** Successfully completed with high-quality results (chip seal followed by microchip seal - flat surface, improved longevity). Finished with minimal delays and ahead of rising material costs, saving money. Strong cooperation from Air Barrier , Sky Aviation , Kaitaia Hospital Emergency Services and users during a 9-day closure. Lost one day to weather.
- Insufficient funds to repair the second cross wind runway which is not approved by CAA -Civil Aviation Authority. There is a possibility for the local Aero Club sourcing funding to restore the second runway in the future and an application to re-open.
- Fencing completed.
- **Infrastructure projects underway:** lighting, fuel tank storage, and car park expansion, all closely coordinated to manage timelines and avoid rework. Rising material costs are a concern, prompting faster procurement.
- **Airport manager housing:** Decision to locate a new building . A formal tender process has been finalised, with local contractors involved. Rental arrangements will continue for occupants.
- **Terminal and facilities:** Arcline presented three options (renovation, extension, or new build). Preference to go with a new building -old airport will be used during construction and will be demolished after. Plans are also progressing for a shed and tractor unit.
- **Cost and funding management:** Focus on aligning projects with council funding deadlines and managing inflation pressures through early procurement and contract strategies.
- **Airport improvements:** Plans for entrance clean-up, fencing, drainage, and interim interior upgrades. Cultural enhancements (including carvings and naming) are being explored.
- **Next steps:** Ongoing coordination, stakeholder engagement, procurement decisions, and maintenance actions to keep projects on track. Cultural Advisor Hine Te Waipuna Popata aboard . Mana whenua to confirm their combined trust details.
- Overall, the project is progressing well with strong coordination, cost awareness, and a focus on long-term infrastructure and community-aligned improvements. Ahipara Takiwā have monthly oversight & maintenance hui with Beca, of the site to monitor progress & to ensure there are no adverse effects to the local river and Kāiririkura. They want a local to maintain the weeding.

Taipā Wastewater Treatment Plant - Ngāti Kahu Hapu & Community Working Group

pioneered an electrocoagulation unit and FNDC is in process of purchasing site 20 for wetland. At the Taipā plant, wastewater from the large maturation pond is being pumped through the Electro Coagulation unit, settler tank and screw press. The resulting clean water can go to the wetland, and once the irrigation

system is in place, it can go directly to land instead of the Parapara River & into Taipā estuary



Te Mauri o Te Wai Hapu & Community Group

won a 40 year stand against sewage outfall into local rivers and Hokianga Harbour recently relocated away from Te Raupō- he wāhi tapu. The working group saved \$millions using the electrocoagulation unit , a state-of-the-art system - which was pioneered in Taipā & uses an

electrical current to separate waste from water. They await solar power & remedies at 3 other Hokianga wwtp sites : Opononi, Omāpere & Kaikohe .
